Sandwichitos de Mezcla

"Sándwiches de mezcla", was first introduced into Puerto Rican cuisine in the 1950s and became part of our parties' favorite. By the mid 1960s, many Puerto Ricans had access to TV sets and "El Show del Medio Día" became part of the housewives' daily rituals with different segments including cooking demonstrations. My grandmother, Doña Lola, loved the cooking segment and incorporated many recipes adding her own "criollo touch". These sándwiches were always part of her parties and celebrations. To commemorate Mother's Day, and to reminisce Doña Lola, here is her interpretation of this traditional Puerto Rican recipe:

Ingredients:

12 oz Spam Ham

2 jars (8 oz ea.) Cheese Wiz

4 oz Cream Cheese

2 oz Mayonnaise

½ tsp lemon juice

2 to 3 tbs evaporated milk

1-2 cloves of garlic (optional)

4 oz pimiento "morron" without the liquid

6 stuffed olives with pimiento

1-2 loafs of sliced white bread (optional: cut the crusts out, just

as Doña Lola)

Directions:

- 1. In a food processor or blender gradually add all of the ingredients, except the bread, until you get a creamy consistency to spread.
- 2. Put "mezcla" in the refrigerator for 30 minutes.
- 3. Spread 1 to 2 tbs of the spread over slices of bread to make sandwiches.
- 4. Cut bread diagonal to make the triangles, as showed in the picture.
- 5. Make sure the knife is clean every time you cut the bread into triangles.
