
NACOPRW-SoCal celebrates what unites all of us: our love and respect for Puerto Rico, its traditions and people.

EL FOGÓN BORICUA by Gloria San Miguel , Second Vice-President

¡EL PERNIL PERFECTO!

Any Puerto Rican celebration centers on the food table. In my house the star of the show was the delicious "pernil" that my dad carefully prepared. He would always buy the best piece of meat at least 2 days ahead and seasoned it with his special "adobo" recipe. Once seasoned, he would place the meat in a plastic bag and keep it in the refrigerator so the marinade would flavor the meat completely. As it was roasting, the aromas would fill my home making our neighbors jealous of the big feast that the San Miguel's were having. My father's biggest pride was that his pernil would come out with "el cuerito tostadito." Finally, he would sharpen his knives and slice the meat like a pro, leaving no trace of meat on the bone. During the Holidays I prepare pernil with his recipe and the aromas take me back to our house in Bayamón with Papi y Mami.

Instructions:

Adobo: for each pound of meat multiply the following ingredients and mash in a "pilón"

- 1 clove of garlic
- 1 black peppercorn
- 1 teaspoon of salt
- 1 teaspoon of olive oil
- $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon vinegar (white or apple cider)
- ¼ teaspoon dry oregano

Notes:

- As you prepare this adobo it will feel very salty. Trust the recipe. A pork roast is a big piece of meat with a thick skin and a bone. The saltiness will go as the pernil is cooked.
- You can lift the skin with a knife and put adobo between the skin and meat.
- If you don't have a "pilon" you can make it in the food processor. Instead of peppercorn, use regular ground black pepper (1/4 teaspoon for 8 peppercorns.)
- Pre-heat oven to 350F. Bake pork roast in the oven UNCOVERED for approximately 25-30 minutes per pound or until internal temperature reaches 160F (71C).
- This recipe can also be used on any other meats (chicken or turkey) for an amazing "pavochón".

A BRILLIANT STAR KEEPS ON SHINING: Elba Estrella Cintrón Girona

We recently lost a brilliant, creative, and dynamic star on earth, and now she is destined to bring joy and light to heaven as she gracefully stepped away from this world to enter the next. Our dear former NACOPRW SoCal member, Elba Estrella Cintrón-Girona passed away on August 26, 2022, in Puerto Rico, after some setbacks in her health. She was surrounded by her loving daughter, our former President and Vice President, Marisol Rexach as well as by the rest of her dear family. She was 93 years old and always beautiful.

A native of the town of Utuado, Doña Elba was a graduate of the University of Puerto Rico where she also got her teaching credential. She moved to Massachusetts in 1964 with her four children and attained a master's degree in special education at the University of Massachusetts, Amherst. Marisol shared that, "Her dedication to the families of Chicopee began in 1967, as a Social Worker for the Massachusetts Welfare Department. This brought her close to schools, which led to her lengthy 19-year career as a Spanish teacher at both Chicopee High School and Chicopee Comprehensive High School".

Doña Elba returned to Puerto Rico to find renewed energy in teaching at the university and also serving as president of the Board of Trustees at Colegio Universitario de San Juan. She made time to also pursue her love of literature by authoring two books of poetry, <u>Te Busco Amante</u> and <u>Retazos</u>, which she showcased upon her return to live with Marisol in California. That's when we were fortunate enough to meet her and garner her support for our student mentees through her involvement in *De Mujer a Mujercita*, as well as other events such as our annual holiday parrandas, which she enjoyed immensely. She was a delight to be around, supporting her daughter and our work in the community, just as she had in Puerto Rico. Recently, Friends of San Juan National Historic Site honored Doña Elba's memory in a special recognition, http://www.friendsofsjnhs.org/. She was the very first donor and supported this non-profit faithfully, as she did others that educated children and which supported the Puerto Rican community, of which she was immensely proud. We honor the memory of Doña Elba Estrella Cintrón-Girona. May she rest in peace and power, and may we emulate her example as she was a radiant Puerto Rican woman of distinction.
